Community Change Grants

These grants are highly targeted and provide multi-year funding to programs and collaborations that are working alongside United Way to solve our community's most challenging problems in health, education, and financial stability.



Community Building

United Way brings nonprofits, businesses, government, and people together to innovate and find new solutions to community problems. This work often leads us to open new grant opportunities or establish pilot projects. It's hard and rewarding work.



Community Essentials Grants

With 45% of our households struggling to make ends meet, our community must have a strong safety net. These grants support our most vulnerable neighbors experiencing the hardest of times through an efficient and effective safety net of services with minimal to no barriers.

United Way consistently asks two fundamental questions: Who in our community is in crisis, vulnerable, and disproportionately affected by current circumstances? And how can we fund and create partnerships that will best alleviate that? Here's how we find answers to these questions:



Community Report

The 2023 Community Report documents, in one location, an overview of data representing the human condition in our community. Titled "A Crossroads for Change", the 2023 Report finds our community at a key post-pandemic crossroads. Published twice a decade, the latest report contains 35 graphs, charts, and data visualizations. It also contains an entirely new section on Violence Reduction.

Community Relationships

We do not work in a vacuum. United Way is a member of dozens of community partnerships, roundables, workgroups and coalitions. Our many relationships help us explore innovative solutions and encourage fresh partnerships.



Community Impact Committee & Solutions Teams

A diverse group of volunteers oversees United Way's grant processes and help United Way monitor community conditions. Our Community Solutions Teams are subject-matter experts who provide deep knowledge of best practices. Both groups ensure United Way is considering all angles when setting goals and awarding grants.



Surveys and 211 Data

The lived experiences of our community members matter deeply. We conduct periodic surveys to better understand our community's top concerns. Additionally, we utilize data from our 211 Help Line to better understand how our community's challenges are presenting in the day to day lives of our neighbors.

Building for her future

Mylasia entered the YouthBuild program at 17 as a single mother of one and determined to earn her high school diploma despite the many challenges in her life. As the child of an incarcerated parent, she looked forward to being the first in her family to graduate and move on to support her child through a career. She self-advocated, learned team leadership abilities, and flourished to become a class tutor, helping other members with classwork and assignments. Mylasia graduated in December of 2022 with her diploma, NCCER certification, and flaggers.

CHARLIE

Developmental screenings turn meltdowns into curiosity and growth

Developmental screenings for infants and preschoolers are a very important piece of many of United Way's Early Grade Level Success grant programs. Screening helps parents and early learning professionals check that children's development is on track, identify strengths and needs, and plan learning activities.

When two-year-old Charlie first entered one of our grant programs, he had only one word: "No."

He did not engage with other children. He preferred to be by himself, repetitively playing with cars and dinosaurs, lining them up, and throwing everything from the shelves. He also spent his time running around various rooms. Charlie walked on his toes, did not imitate any words or actions, and did not engage in any reciprocal games. He would have a meltdown when transitioning to other rooms or events. He didn't like to be changed from clothing or even his diaper.

The great news? The program Charlie attends receives a United Way grant that allows them to provide free developmental screenings, and the staff is highly trained in early learning activities that help children grow.

As Charlie came to the program more often, the staff developed a relationship with him, and he began to show signs of growth. The program implemented the goals identified during his developmental screening, and Charlie began to build his vocabulary and interests in other things. He even placed the magnetic letters in the kitchen in alphabetical order during meal times!

Charlie is still his spunky self, developing quite well within the program, and is growing each time he attends. He gets excited whenever he comes to the program and now loves interacting with others – a key part of school readiness.

Managed Programs

United Way supplements our grant work with a select number of special managed programs. These programs fill a unique community need and are often funded by grants.



United Way's **Ride United: Last Mile Delivery** initiative, in partnership with DoorDash, delivers essential items such as food and other essential items to the doorsteps of area families in need.

We partner with local food pantries and nonprofits to deliver necessities at no cost to neighbors who are not able to access items on their own - including new mothers, people with disabilities, and homebound seniors.

2,365 deliveries to over 150 households.

United Way's **Bottom Line Diaper Bank** provides diapers free of charge to local programs serving parents and caregivers facing financial difficulties, offering a helping hand during challenging moments.

In 2023, monthly diaper distributions ranged from 10,000 - 14,000 diapers.
